Electing trustees ensures local needs come first

This month Kiwash Electric members in districts 2, 4 and 6 will select someone to represent them on the Kiwash Electric board of trustees. The opportunity to choose your representative is a distinct characteristic of electric co-ops that serves an important purpose.

Board members set the policies that govern your co-op. Giving each member a say in how the co-op is run ensures Kiwash Electric remains locally controlled and focused on local needs. Because board members are co-op members, too, they share the impact of their decisions.

Certain qualifications apply to serve on the board of trustees. The Kiwash Electric Cooperative bylaws defines the qualifications for trustees, and explains the process of nominating candidates.

A smart way to keep the lights on

t Kiwash Electric Cooperative, we believe the smart way to keep the lights on in the future is through a diverse portfolio of energy resources. Renewable energy sources, energy efficiency measures, new gas fired plants, and

cleaner coal technology are all in our power supplier's energy mix for the future.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), the demand for electricity in the U.S. is expected to increase by 40 percent over the next 22 years. Even with optimistic projections of a nine percent increase in efficiency and continued growth in renewable power sources, our nation may soon run out of generating capacity.

We *must* build more power plants and

transmission lines to keep the lights on.

Co-ops have a great story to tell in how we're tackling each of these ambitious goals. In 2007, more than 12 percent of the Kiwash Electric Cooperative energy mix was generated by zero emissions source— 9.8 percent hydro and 2.8 percent wind.

Kiwash Electric and electric cooperatives across the nation are also recognized industry leaders in promoting energy efficiency and wise energy use. This helps reduce the need to build as much generation capacity.

When it comes to energy, Kiwash Electric Cooperative recognizes that our consumers ultimately pay the freight for whatever decisions are made. As our commitment to you, we will work to ensure that our legislators and regulators


> understand this fact as well. We will help identify practical longterm remedies based on new technology that will allow us to continue providing safe, reliable, and affordable power in an environmentally responsible fashion.

Western Farmers Electric Cooperative, our power provider, is working hard to provide a portfolio of diverse energy solutions. Thirty megawatts (MW) of distributive generation will be available in the next few months that

will help during the peak summer months. By year's end, 19 MW of new wind energy should be available through a contract with another wind farm developer.

As a part of WFEC's large capacity expansion project plan, 135 MW of new gas generation load will be available by the summer of 2009.

With ongoing upgrades, technological improvements and energy-saving programs for members, Kiwash Electric and electric cooperatives across the nation are doing everything possible to meet future energy needs. Through it all, our drum beat will be loud and clear: "We're putting our consumers members first."

Old Fashioned Peach Ice Cream

INGREDIENTS

- 4 cups milk
- 2 ½ cups sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 5 cups heavy cream
- 2 cups pureed peaches or nectarines
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- $\frac{1}{\sqrt{4}}$ teaspoon almond extract (optional)

DIRECTIONS

In a heavy saucepan, heat milk over low until hot but not boiling. Stir in sugar and salt until dissolved. Gradually stir a quarter of the hot mixture into eggs, mixing constantly. Return all to the saucepan, stirring constantly. Continue to cook and stir for 10-12 minutes or until mixture coats the back of a metal spoon. Remove from the heat; cool. Chill for at least 2 hours or overnight. In a large bowl, combine the cream, fruit, vanilla and almond extract if desired. Add the chilled milk mixture, stirring well. Pour into a chilled freezer can of a 1-gallon ice cream freezer. Freeze according to manufacturer's instructions.

Kiwash Electric bylaws define trustee requirements

Qualifications

Qualifications of a trustee, as listed in the by-laws, Article IV, section 2, states that no person shall be eligible to become or remain a trustee or to hold any position of trust in the Cooperative who: (a) is not a member of the Cooperative and bonafide resident of the particular district which he is to represent; or (b) is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to the members of the Cooperative; or (c) is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary or compensation in excess of one hundred dollars per annum is paid; or (d) is an employee of the Cooperative, or has been employed by the Cooperative and termination of his employment has been less than five years; or (e) is a close relative of an incumbent Trustee or an employee of the Cooperative. "Close relative" is defined as a person who is related to the principal person by consanguenity or affinity within the third degree, including but not necessarily

limited to a person who is either a spouse, child, grandchild, great grandchild, parent, grandparent, great grandparent, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, nephew, or niece, by blood or in-law of the principal; or (f) has been convicted or pled guilty or nolo contendere to a felony.

Nominations

The procedure for nominating and electing trustees is outlined in Article III, Section 7, of the by-laws and states as follows: At a meeting of the Board of Trustees, not less than sixty days preceding each annual meeting of the members, the trustees shall fix a date which shall not be less than fourteen or more than thirty days preceding the annual meeting of the members for the holding of a district meeting for the members residing therein in each of the nine districts for the purpose of electing by ballot by and from the members of each district a trustee to serve as a trustee of the Cooperative. The Board of Trustees shall call the meetings and cause notice of each district meeting to be mailed by the secretary to each member not less than ten days before the meeting,

which call and notice shall indicate the district, which each member belongs. Each district meeting shall be called to order by the trustee, or in his absence, by any member residing within the district. The members shall then proceed to elect a chairman, who shall be someone other than a trustee, and a secretary, each to act for the duration of the meeting

Five percent of fifteen members, whichever is the greater, of the members residing in the district present, at such duly called district meeting, shall constitute a auorum. Members of other districts at the meeting may be heard, but shall have no vote. Voting by Proxy shall not be permitted at such district meetings. The member in each voting district receiving the highest number of votes at the election held at such district meeting shall be elected a trustee of the Cooperative to take office immediately following the ensuing annual meeting of the members. Each trustee shall serve for the period of time for which he is elected or until a successor shall have been elected and shall have qualified.

Applicants home cannot be leased, rented or under contract to be sold.

Each household is allowed only one entry.

Employees of Kiwash Electric Cooperative and its affiliated companies, and advertising agencies, and the immediate family members of, and any persons domiciled with, any such employees, are not eligible to enter or to win. The term "immediate family members" includes spouses, parents, grandparents, siblings, children and grandchildren.

This winner will be announced Thursday, August 28, 2008 at KEC's Annual Meeting and the successful applicant will be notified by certified mail. 

Help KEC shave the peak

CONSERVE ENERGY DURING PEAK PERIODS

he heat, the humidity. There's no hiding from summer in Oklahoma.

During July and August when temperatures are at their most extreme,

Kiwash Electric Cooperative and nearly every electric utility in U.S.

keeps a close watch on system-wide energy usage.

Utilities carefully monitor what is known as "peak demand," when systemwide electricity use is at its very highest. The Kiwash Electric system peak is important because it determines what your co-op pays for wholesale power in the future.

"If we can shave that peak, the result is lower wholesale power rates," said Dennis Krueger, Kiwash Electric general manager.

The Kiwash Electric system tends to peak in July and August during the latter part of the day—generally between 4 pm and 8 pm. That's typically the time members get home from work, turn on the air conditioner, wash clothes and cook dinner.

Kiwash Electric members can take action to control the peak demand by making a few slight changes in energy use habits. To lower the peak, members should try to curtail their energy usage during peak periods.

A few small changes in the daily routine can make a difference. Simple suggestions include washing clothes later at night, cooking dinner outside on the grill rather than using the stove, and turning up your air conditioner thermostat to 78°F.

Because energy costs appear destined to climb, Kiwash Electric encourages members to adopt these wise energy habits not only during peak periods but throughout the year.



Help Kiwash Electric lower wholesale power costs: Use less energy from 4 pm to 8 pm during July and August, Kiwash Electric's peak usage months.

- Raise your air conditioner thermostat to 78°F.
- Use fans to circulate air and keep rooms cool.
- Grill dinner outside rather than turning on the stove.
- Do laundry, wash dishes and shower during off-peak hours.
- Close blinds and drapes during the day to block the sunlight.

TOP 10 Energy Efficiency Tips

from Touchstone Energy® Cooperatives of Oklahoma

Clean and inspect central heating and cooling • units. Your heating system and air conditioner should be serviced before each heating and cooling season, by a HVAC dealer. Keep the filters changed monthly to save energy.

Use compact fluorescent light bulbs. ▲ • (CFLs).Install ENERGY STAR® compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs. ENERGY STAR light bulbs use up to 75 percent less energy and last up to 10 times longer than standard incandescent bulbs.

Install ceiling 3 fans. Use ceiling fans in summer and winter to move air through your home. Ceiling fans should run clockwise in the summer, counterclockwise at low speed in winter.

For one-stop energy efficiency information, please visit www.kiwash.coop and click on the Touchstone **Energy Home Energy** Savers icon. It will save you money!

Install a programmable thermostat. Invest in a 4 programmable thermostat. Set it from 72° to 65° for eight hours a day in winter, and from 70° to 78° for eight hours a day in the summer. It will cut your utility bill up to 10 percent!

Insulate your hot water heater. You will use less Insulate your not water neater. Too will also be energy if your water heater is insulated with a water heater blanket.

Purchase Energy Star labeled products. • Purchase ENERGY STAR products, which are approved by the Department of Energy. You can cut your energy bills by up to 30 percent with Energy Star-labeled appliances, lighting, windows, office equipment and home electronics.

Shade your home from the sun. Plant trees to • shade your home on the southern and western sides to reduce cooling costs in the summer. Planting shrubs, bushes and vines next to your house creates dead air space that insulates your home in both winter and summer.

Add cellulose insulation. Add more insulation to • the attic and crawl spaces. Insulate around furnace ducts, plumbing and boiler pipes. Cellulose insulation is made from recycled newspapers, is sound proof, fire resistant, insect resistant and is the best choice for insulation.

Insulate heating ducts and keep them in good • repair. If you have small cracks or holes in your air ducts, warm air from the furnace can escape causing a loss of up to 60 percent of warmed air. Use duct tape to repair and seal holes.

Stop the drafts. Caulk, seal and weather-• strip around all exterior seams, cracks and openings. Reduce drafts from the inside by replacing weather-stripping; caulking leaky doors, windows, chimneys and fireplaces. Install foam gaskets behind outlet covers.

Splish splash, it's summer!

Make it safe—avoid electrical hazards near water.

ummer is officially here and that means it's time to cool down. While soaking up the sun at the lake or pool is a great way to relax, Kiwash Electric reminds you to take precautions when you're near electricity. The old adage "water and electricity don't mix" is a good one. For a safe summer, please heed these simple tips:



Keep outlets near hot tubs, spas, and pools covered and dry between uses. New outlet

covers are available that offer weather protection while a plug is inserted into the outlet.

- Keep cords and plugs away from hot tubs, spas, pools, and puddles from
- Never handle electrical items, plugs, or outlets when wet. If an electrical product falls into water, do not reach into the water for it. Make sure you are dry and not in contact with water or metal surfaces, and unplug it immediately or shut off the circuit powering the item.
- Outlets on or near hot tubs, spas, and pools should be protected by a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI). Many older swimming pools pre-date the introduction of GFCIs in the 1970s. These pools should be upgraded to add GFCI protection for branch circuits supplying power to underwater pool lights operating above 15 volts, and outlets within 20 feet of the pool.

Please remember, however, that when a person gets immersed in an isolated body of water like a hot tub, the water could become electrified without involving a ground fault as the electric current passes through water (and perhaps a person) from one electrical pole to the opposite pole. In this case, the GFCI may not provide shock or electrocution protection.
