Tip of the Month

Use your microwave for cooking whenever possible. They use 50 to 65 percent less energy than conventional ovens and do not heat up your house in the summer. However, conventional ovens may be more appropriate for larger size items when cooking time is increased.

Scholarships available for graduates

\$500 for college, university or technical school

iwash Electric Cooperative (KEC) is offering four \$500 college scholarships to seniors who graduate from a high school in coop service territory.

KEC will host an essay contest to select its scholarship recipients. The essay topic is "Meeting climate change goals and keeping electricity reliable and affordable."

To be considered for a scholarship, the applicant's parent or legal guardian must be a member of KEC. Relatives of KEC trustees or employees are not eligible to participate.

Scholarships may be used to cover tuition expenses at a two or four year university, or two year technical school. Recipients must maintain full-time student status according to the minimum hour requirements at their specific university or tech school. To remain eligible for additional scholarship funds, the student must maintain a grade point average of 2.5 (on a scale of 4.0).

The deadline to enter the KEC scholarship competition is March 15, 2010. For more details, please contact Lisa Willard at 888-832-3362.

HOW TO ENTER:

- 1. Type a 500 word, double-spaced essay on the chosen subject, "Meeting climate change goals and keeping electricity reliable and affordable."
- 2. Prepare a cover sheet with your name, home address, telephone number, name of school, and email address (if available). Please include a recent photograph of yourself.
- 3. Deliver or mail your essay to Kiwash Electric Cooperative, Attn: Lisa Willard, P.O. Box 100, Cordell, OK 73632, by March 15, 2010. Essays can also be emailed to lwillard@kiwash.coop.

Essays will be judged on the student's understanding and knowledge of the subject, originality, creativity, composition, neatness and grammar.





House of Representatives energy-climate bill (House Bill 2454) that mandates emission controls that will affect carbon-based fuels. The Senate subcommittee

Public Works passed the Senate version on this bill (SB 1733). These energy bills will make each and every American reconsider energy efficiency as a part of their lifestyle, and force us to either conserve energy or pay the tax bill associated with burning carbon-based fuels.

These political actions are spurring a new philosophy about electric rates. The short answer to this new philosophy is electric consumption (energy) charges will decrease while customer charges will increase. Kiwash Electric is adopting this new strategy by increasing the customer charge to \$30 per month while dramatically reducing the energy charges.

New rate includes new options

Low usage and time of use rates save money

Kiwash Electric's new rate structure includes two new rates that could help members and the co-op save money. A special low usage rate (Rate 120) is offered for low income residents. For members interested in lowering their use during peak usage periods, be sure to check out the time of use rate (Rate 130).

RATE 120 RESIDENTIAL LOW USE

For residential consumers on fixed or low incomes, Kiwash Electric's Low Usage Rate 120 is worth looking into. The advantage of Rate 120 is a \$15 per month customer charge compared to a \$30 customer charge in the standard rates.

Member who aualify

for the low usage rate should not exceed 600 kilowatt hours (kwh) per month between June 1st and September 30th. If you exceed 600 kwh per month during the summer months, the kwh charge is four times higher for energy used above 600 kwh. If metered consumption exceeds 600 kwh, Kiwash



Electric may review your billing history to determine if a better rate exists for you.

Rate 120 must be renewed at the beginning of each year. To qualify for the rate, applicants live in their home full time. In addition, applicants must provide proof that they are approved for the Oklahoma Department of Human Services LIHEAP program from June 1st through September 30th.Rate 120 applications are available at the Kiwash office or by calling 888-832-3362.

RATE 130 EXPERIMENTAL RESIDENTIAL TIME-OF-USE

An experimental rate for Kiwash Electric, the residential time of use rate (Rate 130) is only available for the first 25 qualified applicants. If the rate proves beneficial to the co-op and its members, KEC will continue to offer the rate to other members.

Time of use rates are used by utilities to lower their system wide demand for power, which is a determining factor in wholesale power costs. To qualify for Rate 130, members must be willing to reduce their energy consumption from 2 pm through 8 pm during June, July, August and September. Electricity used during these on-peak hours will cost \$0.2625 cents per kwh, providing a large monthly energy savings. The downside to this rate is a large electric bill if the member fails to conserve during the stated on-peak hours.

Any electricity used outside the six hour period will cost \$0.0675 per kwh.

Time of use rates are designed for consumers who believe they can drastically reduce their summer energy usage during on-peak hours. If you can turn the air conditioner off and only use minimal electricity during these peak usage periods, then Rate 130 could work for you.

To be considered for Rate 130, members must submit an application before May 1, 2010. If you're interested in this program, please call Kiwash Electric at 888-832-3362 and request a Rate 130 application, or drop by and pick it up Monday -Friday, 7:30 am to 5:30 pm. A complete rate sheet will be provided with the application.

Easy Slow Cooker Pot Roast

INGREDIENTS

4 pounds chuck roast salt and pepper to taste

1 packet dry onion soup mix

1 cup water

3 carrots, chopped

1 onion, chopped

3 potatoes, peeled and cubed

1 stalk celery, chopped

DIRECTIONS

Take the chuck roast and season with salt and pepper to taste. Brown on all sides in a large skillet over high heat.

Place in the slow cooker and add the soup mix, water, carrots, onion, potatoes and celery.

Cover and cook on low setting for 8 to 10 hours.

Yield 6 to 8 servings

This new direction will cause a system-wide average rate increase of 4.65 percent that will be incorporated into the bills you receive on or about February 1st. This will affect all the electric rates paid by members.

The board of directors and management of Kiwash Electric Cooperative resisted a rate increase for as long as possible, but the time has come. Rest assured, the decision was not an easy one. Your cooperative leaders made a thorough investigation into all the financial and human factors involved before making their recommendation, and they should be commended for their efforts. Your cooperative and its leaders are doing everything possible to hold down costs while bringing you safe and reliable electric service today, and in the future.

Save more energy this year

f your New Year's resolution is to spend less and save more in 2010, don't overlook your energy use. You can save money each month by making just a few small changes around the house.

Save up to

- 20 percent
 on heating by
 installing a
 programmable
 thermostat that
 automatically
 lowers the heat
 when you leave
 the house for
 more than five hours, or when
 you go to bed for the night.
- Save one percent to three percent on heating costs for each degree you turn the thermostat down. For optimal savings, set the thermostat at 68 degrees while at home and 65 degrees before you leave the house for the day.
- Save up to 20 percent on heating and cooling bills by sealing air leaks around doors and windows with caulk and weather stripping. This inexpensive energy saver will pay for itself within a year.
- Save at least 25 percent on air conditioning when you replace your old central a/c with one that has a seasonal energy efficiency ratio (SEER) of 13 or higher.



- Save up to 40 percent on refrigerator operating costs by replacing your old unit with a new Energy Star model.
- Save more than 50 percent on energy for cooking by using a microwave instead of a conventional oven.
- Save more than 10 percent on water heating by lowering the water heater temperature from 140°F. to 120°F.
- Save 75 percent on energy for lighting by replacing incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent lights.

Are you ready for winter?

Prepare for storms with the following essentials:



- *Light. Keep a flashlight and extra batteries handy. Use care when burning candles; open flames are a dangerous fire hazard.
- *Warmth. Have extra blankets or a sleeping bag for each person. Don't use gas stoves, kerosene heaters or other open-flame heat sources. Deadly carbon monoxide gas could build up in your home without your knowing.

- ****Water.** If you have a water well and pump, keep an emergency supply of bottled water.
- ***Food.** Stock an emergency supply of convenience foods that don't require cooking.
- **News and information.** Keep a battery-powered radio with extra batteries on hand.
- *Means of communication. Keep a plain, hard-wired telephone handy; you may need it to report your electricity is out. Many cordless or feature-laden telephones require a plug-in power source to operate, and may not work if a power outage occurs. A cell phone will work as long as its battery is charged and the nearest cell tower has power or battery backup power.
